

Adult Basic Education and Training

Education is an essential component of the reconstruction, development and transformation of South African society. The government's policy for adult basic education and training (ABET) must be understood within the overarching goal of building a just and equitable syste that provides good-quality education and training to adult learners throughout the country.

ABET is the conceptual foundation for the learning and development of lifelong skills. As an outcomes-based programme, ABET aims to provide basic learning tools, knowledge and skills, and provides participants with nationally recognised qualifications.

As part of our SLP 3 initiatives, Khumani Mine is committed to assisting the local government in the relocation of two modular classrooms to the Sishen Primary School for an ABET centre. This centre will be able to accommodate 63 learners per session, which translates to a legacy of improved education in the communities of the Gamagara Local Municipality. The Sishen Primary School benefits from this initiative by having additional classrooms available for their developing English-phase classes. The school recently introduced two Grade 1 classes and two Grade 2 classes, with the two English legs developing as learners pass their current grade and move on to higher grades.

Apart from the provision of furniture and airconditioning units, Khumani Mine installed solar electricity systems after the relocation of the two classrooms to ensure the modular classes can function independently in the evenings when adult learning will take place.

How to tell if it's a real job opportunity or an ugly scam

With several elaborate job scams plaguing the internet, it is safe to say that we could all do with a few tips to ensure we are conducting a safe job search.

If it's too good to be true, it's probably a scam. If a position sounds like a dream come true and you cannot believe your luck, chances are the advert is probably a scam.

Also, if the 'hiring manager' is requesting important documents urgently, or if the information requested makes you feel uncomfortable, or something just does not seem right, proceed with caution.

Look at the grammar of the advert, pay close attention to the follow-up emails or phone calls. How do they request your information? Via fax?

If so, it might be a scam.

Obvious red flags to be aware of:

- The company wants to hire you without interviewing you.
- The advert has grammaical and spelling errors.
- When you are meant to start, your employer tells you that they are abroad and need you to run a few errands for them.
- You have to provide the employer with credit card or bank account details and personal information.
- You did not contact them, they contacted you.
- You are offered an incentive often a large sum of money – for using your bank account to transfer money or deposit cash.
- They tell you that they have deposited a large sum of money into your account, but it may take a week or two to reflect.
- You are promised a six-figure salary for doing little to no work.
- The job advert looks valid, but the contact's email (e.g. sam@gmail.com) differs from the company's website domain (e.g. sam@XYZLimited.com).
- The job advertises how much money you will make rather than what your duties and responsibilities will be.
- You need to pay fees for a uniform or induction anything that involves you having to pay for a job application is fraudulent.

When the Constitutional
Court unanimously ruled to decriminalise
the use of cannabis in September 2018, many
people did not pay much attention to the details of
the ruling. Many thought that everyone was now
free to use or smoke cannabis to their
heart's content

The key points made by Chief Justice Raymond Zondo in reading out the judgement are:

- An adult person may use or be in possession of cannabis in private for his or her personal consumption in private.
- The use, including smoking, of cannabis in public or in the presence of children or in the presence of non-consenting adult persons is not permitted.
- The use or possession of cannabis in private other than by an adult for his or her personal consumption is not permitted.
- The cultivation of cannabis by an adult in a private place for his or her personal consumption in private is no longer a criminal offence.

It is important to note that it remains illegal to use or smoke cannabis/dagga/marijuana/weed in public, or in the presence of children or non-consenting adults. So, if you visit someone who objects to it, smoking cannabis is not permitted. Regarding the growing of cannabis, the ruling emphasises that this applies to growing it in a private place for personal use. This means that the dealing in/selling of cannabis remains illegal.

Since the ruling, several dismissal cases have been ruled on, both in the CCMA and the Labour Court. In one of the earlier cases (*Mthembu and Others v NCT Durban Wood Chips*) the CCMA upheld the dismissal of several employees for positive cannabis tests. A key consideration in that ruling was the dangerous work they did.

The circumstances in a more recent case reported in GroundUp on 2 July 2022 are significantly different, in that the dismissal of an office-based employee for repeatedly testing positive for cannabis was upheld by the Labour Court. The court ruled that the decriminalisation of cannabis in 2018 does not give protection to employees who are in breach of a company's 'zero tolerance' policy towards the use of intoxicants, whether the employee's performance was impaired or not.

In this case, Labour Court Acting Judge Makosho Ntsoane found that the employee did not present evidence of her claim of medicinal use which she made as an 'afterthought' after she had been caught out. In his ruling, the acting judge reiterated that the company was entitled to its zero tolerance policy, and that the policy was binding on all employees. He found the company had acted consistently in applying its policy.

It is important for employees to be aware of the implications of these rulings. The fact that cannabis can be detected days after it was used, depending on the type of test, poses a problem for employees who use cannabis, especially those who work in companies with a zero-tolerance policy



GAS SAFETY at home

With load shedding a daily reality, many people are turning to gas for cooking and heating. There are a number of safety considerations to observe when using gas.

Although gas is safe to use if correctly installed, unsafe installation or use could lead to explosions and fire. There are a number of guidelines to follow when installing a gas system.



These are some of the South African National Standards (SANS) guidelines:

Gas equipment/system installations must comply with SABS requirements (SANS087).

- Gas bottles may not be installed less than 1 metre from doors/windows.
- A certificate of conformity must accompany the sale of a property with a gas installation
- Copper pipes through walls must be sleeved.
- The installation of gas appliances must have a certificate of conformity.
- Gas bottles heavier than 19 kg must be stored outside.
- Use gas stoves with adequate ventilation.
- Never open the gas flame too high.
- Always turn the gas off properly after use.

Carbon monoxide poisoning Carbon monoxide (CO_2) can be deadly, so know the signs of CO2 leaks to take early action. You may be exposed to gas leaks unknowingly.

CO₂ is produced by unburnt fuel. CO₂ can be found near an open fire, a cooker, water, central heating, a gas fire and a boiler.

Symptoms of CO₂ poisoning include:

- Pale skin
- Dizziness
- Chest pain
- Drowsiness
- Nosebleeds
- Flu-like symptoms
- Difficulty breathing
- Ringing in your ears (tinnitus)

If you suspect that there is a gas leak, open all windows and doors, turn off the gas valve, vacate the property and contact your local emergency services.

Have your appliances checked and serviced at least once a year and keep your loved ones safe by following our tips.

Khumani Mine would like to remind you to follow these tips to stay safe:


- Do not stop for anyone. If you suspect that the person might be a false official, drive to the nearest police station, shopping centre or any other busy area.

- If someone tries to force you out of the road, stay calm and constantly blow your horn to draw attention.

- 2. Aluminium foil
- 3. Rice
- 4. Clear Sellotape

- 7. Coloured paper

Wrap this thin piece of foil in a spiral shape tightly around the handle of a wooden spoon.



Pull the spiralled foil sticks from the broom handle and wooden spoon's handle and insert the smaller spiral into the larger spiral. NB! This is the key step that makes the rain



Place the end of the paper towel tube onto a sheet of paper and trace a circle around it. Do this twice (once for each end).



Draw a bigger circle around the small circles you just drew.

Cut out the larger circles.

lots of cuts from the edge of the paper to the inner circle.



stick work.



Once one end of the tube is closed, insert the two foil spirals you created.



coloured paper



Wrap a sheet of around the tube. You can also decorate vour rain sticks with , Koki's and rubber bands.
